



At any given time there are


- policemen pretending to be addicts,




Some police cannot spell.



One place that the drug industry is vulnerable is the need for money laundering. HSBC was implicated in money laundering.


HSBC has confirmed it is to pay US authorities \$1.9bn (£1.2bn) in a settlement over money laundering, the largest paid in such a case.

“The US government decided not to pursue criminal charges against HSBC for allowing terrorists and drug dealers to launder millions of dollars after George Osborne and the UK banking regulator intervened to warn that prosecuting Britain’s biggest bank could lead to a “global financial disaster”.

On Monday, a congressional report published letters and emails from Osborne and Financial Services Authority (FSA) officials to their US counterparts warning that launching criminal action against HSBC in 2012 could have sparked a “financial calamity”.

"It is my view (confirmed by Brian Faulkner before his death) that the decision to use methods of torture in Northern Ireland in 1971/72 was taken by ministers – in particular Lord Carrington, then secretary of state for defence" Merlyn Reese

1973 Chile – the Britain of Latin America had a coup – Tortures, killings, and disappearances, were carried out by the military and police. Police chief César Mendoza was part of the Junta.


I grew breasts, went to college, joined my first picket line at Grunwicks and decide that the Police are the spawn of Sauron.

Peel and the Tory government set up the Metropolitan Police Force in 1829.




These modes of thinking became entrenched in habits of thinking of the police.

Every one is a mixture of their childhood beliefs and their daily experience. In the case of the police the experience is likely to reinforce conservative values



The South Yorkshire force had a motive - to distract attention from its own failings, as highlighted by Taylor - and the opportunity to brief journalists off the record. All the newspapers, news agencies, TV and radio outlets, relied entirely on the police for the reporting of scandalous and inaccurate allegations. 17th October 2011

Hillsborough was a tragic accident. 95 people died in a crush at the stadium. Errors were made by safety inspectors, Sheffield Wednesday Football club and the police. Rather than accept this as an accident and learning the lessons, the police went in for a cover up on an industrial scale. Their vicious lies were spread by the media and Tory Politicians.



March 14, 1991: Birmingham Six freed after 16 years in prison for pub bomb attacks

Six men, jailed for life in 1975 for two bomb attacks on Birmingham pubs, were freed when forced confessions and fabricated evidence came to light.



After false confessions were beaten out of them, the Birmingham 6 appealed. Denning was one of the judges who joined the cover up. 'Just consider the course of events if their action were to proceed to trial ... If the six men failed it would mean that much time and money and worry would have been

expended by many people to no good purpose. If they won, it would mean that the police were guilty of perjury; that they were guilty of violence and threats; that the confessions were involuntary and improperly admitted in evidence; and that the convictions were erroneous. ... That was such an appalling vista that every sensible person would say, 'It cannot be right that these actions should go any further.

Denning said 'We shouldn't have all these campaigns to get the Birmingham Six released if they'd been hanged. They'd have been forgotten and the whole community would be satisfied'

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Police fail to record one in five of all crimes reported to them, says report

More than 800,000 - or one in five - of all crimes reported to the police each year are not being recorded by officers, a report suggests.

The problem is greatest for victims of violent crime, with a third going unrecorded. Of sexual offences, 26% are not recorded.

Metropolitan police report released after 30 years says Blair Peach was most likely killed by elite riot squad officer



(and anti anti racist)Blair Peach- Police hid the truth for 30 years. 'The reports into the death of Blair Peach were published on the Metropolitan Police website on 27 April 2010. The conclusion was that Blair Peach was killed by a police officer, but that the other police officers in the same unit had refused to cooperate with the inquiry by

lying to investigators, making it impossible to identify the actual killer.'



In 2011, eight former police officers were charged with conspiring to pervert the course of justice. Their subsequent trial was the largest police corruption trial in British criminal history. In November 2011, the trial collapsed when the defence claimed that copies of files which they said they should have seen had instead been destroyed.

Steven Lawrence was a black teenager murdered by racist thugs. The police botched the investigation, partly through racism and partly through corruption. The police did send undercover police to dig for dirt into the Lawrence family

Mike Mansfield asked "Do you find that it is rather disturbing that it has taken you all this time to recognise a basic tenet of criminal law?" Mr Weeden,[the policeman in charge of the Steven Lawrence murder inquiry for 18 months] now retired, responded: "I think it is regrettable." The BBC on May 27th. 1998

IPCC investigates claim police spied on Christopher Alder family after death

Watchdog says sister of ex-paratrooper who died in police custody may have been placed under surveillance





Police are to be investigated over allegations that they placed under "improper" surveillance the sister of ex-paratrooper Christopher Alder, who died on the floor of a police station.

Janet Alder has spent years campaigning to find the truth behind one of the most controversial deaths in police custody. Her barrister is also alleged to have been put under surveillance, raising questions over the ethics of police monitoring of lawyers. The espionage is alleged to have happened at the time of the inquest that found Christopher had been unlawfully killed in April 1998.



The police have a tendency to infiltrate campaigns




A group of women sued the police over their abuse by under cover police. "We believe our case highlights institutionalised sexism within the police. It is incredible that if the police want to search someone's house they are required to get the permission of a judge, yet if they want to send in an agent who may live and sleep with activists in their homes, this can happen without any apparent oversight!"

'The documents show [police] surveillance of the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament, the anti-Apartheid Movement, Vietnam protesters and unions involved in the Wapping industrial dispute.

Special Branch infiltrated meetings and recorded how many people attended demos, where they came from, what was said – and even the colour of buses transporting campaigners.

Scots identified on the previously secret files include the late Jimmy Knapp, former leader of the National Union of Railwaymen (NUR), and Brian Filling, then chairman of the Scottish Anti-Apartheid Movement.'


The Police have never supported a strike (as far as I know) 1980 The Steel strike

Instead we had this 'They [the police] had arrived, he said, proclaiming that they were "up for it" and demonstrated the meaning of that expression by intentionally antagonising the pickets. When their coaches passed through lines of striking miners they waved five

pound notes – the reward for the overtime that policing the strike required, and an irresistible provocation to miners whose families were barely able to buy groceries. They boasted in public houses about what a joy it was to "sort out the Commies" and, flaunting their swollen pay packets, made overtures – often distressingly successful – to local girls.



'On 18 June 1984 a massive injustice was perpetrated on a field beside the Orgreave coking plant near Sheffield. A fundamentally peaceful picket by miners was bulldozed by a form of public-order policing to which many demonstrations – especially the 2010 student protests in Parliament Square – have since been subjected.

Hundreds of police carrying short and long riot shields, organised in snatch-squad units, targeted unarmed miners with truncheons, and inflicted serious injuries, particularly to the head. They were supported by mounted police also wielding truncheons, and by police with dogs. The full horror of what happened can be seen in original footage compiled by Yvette Vanson in her seminal 1985 documentary, *The Battle for Orgreave*. Key graphic moments of miners being dragged and throttled on the ground, kicked and punched through police lines, of horses charging through crowds, of batons being mercilessly and deliberately aimed to cause serious injury, cannot be controverted.' The Present

Racists and fascist organisations have systematically targeted Rotherham. At one stage there were 14 rightwing demonstrations in as many months. A democratically minded police force would say something like this.

A bunch of racists and fascists are coming to Rotherham. We do not want people of Rotherham to suffer in fear and at home at the hands of these thugs. So we want everyone to join the counter protest. We will arrest any racists that racially abuse you.



In fact the police told British Asians to stay away and that if they did demonstrate the police would have zero tolerance for them.

What happened on the day, Sept 4th 2015, was that the counter demonstration was heavily policed. The dispersing anti racists were herded passed a pub where the police knew a group of known racists and fascists had been drinking for two hours.

The dispersing anti racists were racially abused and attacked. When they defended themselves, 12 Rotherham Moslems were arrested (along with some Rotherham racists.)

At the subsequent trial the ten anti racists who pleaded self-defence were acquitted. The other two had already pleaded guilty on bad legal advice.



'The reason that the right wing targeted Rotherham was the horrendous child sexual abuse highlighted by the Jay report. There was an estimated 1,400 abuse victims from 1997 to 2013. The majority of the abusers were described as 'Asian men'.

The Moslem Community and others demonstrated under the slogan "Justice for the victims" "Don't let the Racists divide us."

The guilty party was the abusers.
However social services, the council, and
the police allowed it to continue.





The day to day experience of the police leads them to respect discipline, the chain of command and order. It also leads to a distrust of people who are likely to disturb the peace because they are discriminated against or exploited. The police have a tendency to become inherently anti worker and racist.

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Deaths in British police custody: no convicted officers since 1969

827 people have died during or following police contact since 2004. Families have struggled hard for justice, encountering multiple failures and police collusion from the IPCC. Why is police accountability failing in this most serious of issues?

827 dead?

Mark Duggan, a 29-year-old British man, was shot and killed by police in Tottenham, North London, England, on 4 August 2011. The Metropolitan Police stated that officers were attempting to arrest Duggan on suspicion of planning an attack. A jury found that he was not armed when he was shot but that the killing was justified. There was widespread anger at the police killing. Met Police Commissioner Sir Bernard Hogan-Howe has said that firearms officers are to wear video cameras in an attempt to be "more open" following the death of Mark Duggan. Six years later another black man, suspected drug dealer, was killed. In a pre planned operation six cars surrounded Yassar Yaqub's. He was shot through the windscreen. The police have ensured that we will never know the truth. They did not have a single camera present.



The rigid hierarchy of the police would be less alarming if the people in control were not members of the ruling class.

Keith Hellawell was a failed drug Czar. He was appointed Chair of the notorious Sports Direct in 2009.

The continuing attempt at cover up of the Police actions at Orgreave, the police behaviour in Rotherham, and the police killing of Yasser Yaqub were the spurs that made me complete the work.

The target of this pamphlet is not individual policemen or women. Our rulers have created a police force that functions well for them. A fairer system of law and order will not come till we break the power of the rich and powerful. This is a red 34 production.
